COURSE A

BASIC POLICE JUVENILE OFFICERS COURSE August 30th thru September 3rd, 2010

NOTE: This course is intended for police officers, peace officers, youth officers, D.A.R.E. Officers, School Resource/Safety Officers assigned to youth services-juvenile aid bureaus, or other law enforcement personnel responsible for investigations of crimes committed by or against juveniles.

OVERVIEW

This 5-day, 38-hour DCJS-certified course curriculum will include: role of the juvenile officer, laws and procedures of juvenile custody, laws relating to juveniles and applicable case law, functions of related governmental agencies, juvenile diversion programs, investigative techniques, interview and interrogation skills, interviewing the child victim/witness, child abuse investigations, substance abuse, missing persons overview, signs of suicide, and current trends in juvenile crime.

This course is coordinated by the SNYPJOA Board of Directors.

A certificate will be issued by the Bureau of Municipal Police/Division of Criminal Justice Services, for all participants who are police officers.

COURSE B

ADVANCED POLICE JUVENILE OFFICERS COURSE August 30 thru September 3rd, 2010

NOTE: This course is intended for Police Juvenile Officers, Youth Officers, D.A.R.E. Officers, School Resource Officers, County Attorneys, Prosecutors, and Probation Officers who have completed the Basic Police Juvenile Officers Course.

OVERVIEW

This 5-day, 38-hour **DCJS-certified** course curriculum is specifically designed to enhance the skills, knowledge and confidence of the attendee and meet the demands of the evolving complex world of Juvenile Justice. Emphasis is placed on fingerprintable juvenile custody, JAB record keeping, detention issues, responding to missing children and the Interstate Compact on Juveniles, relevant current information regarding legal issues, cutting and self-injurious behavior, crime prevention through environmental design, S.A.V.E. legislation and adolescent lifestyles, including gothic and gangs. This course is coordinated by the SNYPJOA Board of Directors.

A certificate will be issued by the Bureau of Municipal Police/Division of Criminal Justice Services, for all participants who are police officers.

BASIC SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER COURSE

AUGUST 30th THRU September 3rd, 2010

Limited to 40 Students

NOTE: This course is intended for School Resource Officers, Police Juvenile Law Enforcement Officers, DARE Officers, School Liaison Officers and Supervisors of SRO's, who would also benefit from taking this course.

OVERVIEW

Allyn J. Borrino is a twenty year veteran of the Rochester (NY) Fire Department and Unit Commander of Rochester's Fire Investigation Unit. Allyn is also the coordinator of Rochester's Juvenile Firesetter Intervention Program (F.R.Y.-fire related youth program). Last year the Rochester Fire Investigation Unit (FIU), through the investigation of 1087 fire incidents, was afforded the opportunity to educate hundreds of individuals and families on the subject of fire and life safety. The F.R.Y. Unit had contact with close to three-hundred juveniles and the FIU performed 142 "juvenile firesetting intervention" educational sessions.

Allyn holds an Associates of Applied Science degree from Alfred State College and is currently completing his Bachelor of Science in Fire Service Administration. He holds certifications from the State of New York as a Peace Officer, Level II Fire Investigator, Level II Fire Service Instructor, Level II Juvenile Firesetter Intervention Specialist and Public Fire and Life Safety Educator. ENABLING JUSTICE FOR CHILDREN WITH DISABILITIES

Media, Social Networking and Youth Gangs

OVERVIEW

In today's world, adults and adolescents are being bombarded on a daily basis by news media clips and images via the internet and television. Gangs have now stepped up to the plate and are using the internet to promote their activities. There is even a term associated with gang "wanna bees" or members recruiting via the internet called "net banging." T.V. stations such as the National Geographic have aired shows on the Aryan Brotherhood and the M.S. 13 within the last few months. Adolescents and adults are also reading magazines and playing video games in which gangs are either the prominent topic or character. But let's not forget about the constant barrage of the lyrical content of many different styles of music which condone or promote gang association or membership. Gang members are even now producing and promoting DVD's to further their reach across the country.

During the course of this training session, all of the following methods of promoting gang initiatives through accepted media outlets will be discussed in detail. The concentration will be on the proliferation of gangs using DVD's, the internet, and music to recruit new members and to "educate" others to their initiations and rules. Participants will walk away with an understanding of how gangs are utilizing legitimate media sources to further their own agendas.

WHAT DO YOU DO IN THE ABSENCE OF OBJECTIVE MEDICAL EVIDENCE?

Presented by

Overview:

The purpose of this presentation is to have the participant appreciate the importance, the essential purpose, and the power of the medical evaluation of the abused Child. **And what are we all left with if the objective exam is essentially normal? How is that possible? How can a child, in fact, experience sexual abuse, even penetration, and have a normal objective physical exam?** Should a normal exam preclude further investigation and prosecution? The presentation will focus on three processes: 1) Healing 2) Elasticity of hymenal tissue and 3) Perception.

This workshop will address common misconceptions about the exam. Current research on medical findings will be reviewed, as well as research regarding absence of physical findings in confirmed cases. Visual presentation of healing trauma will demonstrate how quickly children heal and how previous trauma can appear normal within a relatively brief period of time.

In addition, the workshop will address how to effectively engage the child in the medical exam in order to provide a therapeutic experience. It will also discuss response to chronic vs. emergent presentations, illustrate forensically sound documentation of the medical evaluation, and suggest how testimony regarding a normal exam can benefit a case. **This workshop will benefit all members of a multidisciplinary child abuse team, particularly members with investigative or prosecutorial responsibilities.**

The relevance of this presentation is rather self-evident. **Over 70% of our medical exams are considered objectively normal in children who have been, in fact, sexually abused.** This presentation will make it clear to the prosecution, social workers and medical providers as to why this is so and why this lack of evidence can not keep us from protecting our children and making the alleged perpetrator responsible. **This application is applicable to both the beginner and the experienced practitioners.**

In the later half of the presentation we will focus on physical abuse and that which mimics abuse. This will include head trauma, burns, bruises and broken bones (fractures).
